In order to have your pet considered for the Will County Humane Society adoption program, please submit this application along with your pets medical records. PLEASE NOTE: You must include medical records for your pet when turning in your application. Any applications submitted without records will be denied.

Once your application is submitted, our management team will contact you once intake space becomes available. You will be required to attend a meeting with our Admissions team to review your pets medical history and evaluate his/her behavior. Our team will than submit their findings to management for review.

If approved, a surrender fee will be obtained upon intake of your pet. Please see the following page for more information regarding our surrender fees.

Medical Disclosure & Surrender Fee Information

All pets considered for the Will County Humane Society Adoption Program must be current on their vaccinations and testing.

For CATS, this includes proof of a recent negative Feline AIDS and Leukemia Test. If the owner does not have proof of this test, one can be performed at any veterinary clinic for a fee. This fee will be the financial responsibility of the surrendering owner. This fee may vary depending on the veterinary clinic of the owners choosing. Feline AIDS and Leukemia is a contagious virus generally transmitted with prolonged periods of close contact between infected and susceptible cats. Current vaccinations and a negative Feline AIDS and Leukemia Test are essential to this facility seeing as our cattery is free-roaming. This means our cats are never isolated or caged thus living happily amongst one another. Our facility also recommends current FVRCp vaccination and Rabies vaccination. However, both the FCRCp and Rabies vaccinations are not required in order for the pet to be considered for the Adoption Program.

For DOGS, this includes an updated Rabies vaccination, Distemper vaccination, Bordetella vaccination, and negative Heartworm test. Our facility also recommends current Fecal Testing and Influenza vaccination. However, both the influenza vaccination and fecal test are not required in order for the pet to be considered for the Adoption Program. If your pet is NOT current on the required vaccinations or testing, the owner may have them performed at any veterinary clinic for a fee. These fees will be the financial responsibility of the surrendering owner. These fees may vary depending on the veterinary clinic of the owners choosing.

If vaccinations are updated at the time of application submission and the pet has previously been kept current on vaccinations and testing, intake would be immediate once the application process has been completed and your application has been approved.

If the vaccinations are given at the time of application submission and they are the first set of vaccinations your pet has received, the owner will be responsible for receiving booster vaccinations recommended per the Vaccination Protocol. This information can be provided by the owners veterinary care team. Once the pet has received these booster vaccinations, the owner must keep the pet at their residence for 2 weeks after the booster vaccinations are given. This period allows the pets immune system to build up a resistance to the viruses being vaccinated against.

Our Kennel and Cattery are salubrious. In compliance, all of our pets are current on vaccinations and testing, along with preventatives protecting against various diseases and invaders. We take pride in the overall health and well-being of our pets and pursue these precautions to ensure our new and preexisting pets stay healthy.

SURRENDER FEES

Surrender fees are \$100 per dog, and \$50 per cat.

Surrender fees are obtained to aide in the costs rendered during your pets stay. This includes expenses accumulated for feeding, sheltering and caring for your pet. Some of our pets require expenses that far exceed our adoption donation fee for reasons such as congenital, or stress inducing illnesses, or for procedures needed that were not previously performed under the owners care. Most surrender fees only cover a small portion of a pets stay. In addition, please remember our facility is a 501 (c)(3) not-for-profit organization that receives no federal, or state government funding.

PLEASE NOTE: This chart DOES NOT include pricing for prevention regimens against invaders such as heartworm, flea & tick, and parasites. Prevention options should be discussed with your vet to ensure what is best for your pet.
